

Chairman's Comments – Roy Denney

Firstly I would like to compliment Mike Gardner, who has taken over production of this newsletter, on his first edition and would invite all members to let him have material that may be of interest at a regional level. Similarly Kevin Bradley is doing sterling work on our new web site.

James Allen undertook to act as co-ordinator of our SI equipment for the first year and now wishes to hand it on to be able to concentrate of domestic and work matters. I must of course thank him on your behalf for all his past efforts - It must have been quite trying at times trying to manage an evolving process.

I do not think any of us envisaged how much use would be made of the kit and it must have been extremely difficult keeping up with where it was when it rarely came back, more normally being passed from club to club as seems to have been the case.

We did discuss the system at the first committee meeting of the year and were trying to come up with ideas to improve the process. The general view was that if the co-ordinator was being cut out of the loop on a fairly regular basis then the clubs should have some system of signing kit over between themselves so that there was some acknowledgement of any losses etc. (cont on page 4)

It might also be advisable if our Treasurer were more directly involved in the financial side. This matter will be further considered but we do need a volunteer to take on the role in whatever shape it might end up.

If anyone is at all interested they could let me know and will be invited to join the process of restructuring the system without any ultimate commitment to take the job on until they see how it turns out.

It may well be that the role as originally conceived may have to be split in two or even three. At this month's meeting of the Executive Committee they thought there were probably three distinct roles:

- a) managing the kit ; b) administering the system ; c) receiving payment.

If you want to keep up with other matters discussed by that committee their minutes will be going on the EM O A website in future.

Turning to the debate as to the future of your association, to my mind clubs first need to decide whether they support the continuation of EM O A in some form . I strongly do and trust the majority of orienteers in the East Midlands will as well.

If so then do they accept the concept of it becoming a federation of clubs with the clubs being the members.

Assuming they do so, in line with the membership structures now being evolved by BO F , then they will have to adopt a changed constitution which EM O A needs to put before you at our next AGM . Before any further work on it the EM O A committee would like a broad indication from clubs that this is the way forward that they support and to this end I would ask members to let their clubs know their own feelings on the subject.

Assuming we get indications at our May meeting that this is the preferred route then EM O A can discuss and then recommend a constitution for adoption or otherwise at the AGM . An early draft of a possible constitution has been knocked together to help clubs see the likely shape of things to come if we go down this route.

Your regional committee would also have to look into several knock on effects of such a change and bring suggestions to the AGM in these regards. This would include the need to address the funding arrangements and put the various options to that AGM as well.

It just remains to wish you good running and to look forward to warm sunny evenings and the various summer training programmes.

Reflections of a Brambled Basher

Clumber Park Badge Event 17-2-02

Good-day, and it certainly was. After the ravages of Foot and Mouth in 2001 it was good to be back gracing the NOC Clumber Park Badge Event. The Basher and his good lady wife had given it their all - well almost all - with 4 days from him and 3 days from her - in the 2001 Scottish 6-Day event, but that was it for 2001. The excuses for poor performance at Clumber were mentally in place well before setting off on the Sunday morning. Sorting the kit out the night before, firstly revealed one seized up compass - possibly explaining some of the strange route choices taken at the Scottish 6-Days and easily sorted by my technically orientated mentor/mate from DVO. Secondly, a significant outfit choice was made - instead of "aiming off" and choosing the negatively worded, ageing sweatshirt top with a "Come Home" logo, I went positive with a totally colour co-ordinated ensemble of blue, white and yellow; the T-shirt from Strathspey 95, similar coloured tartan lycras from the same era and my blue and yellow Walsh PBs.

Health Matters

LEI Forces Project by Roy Denney

This is a report on the progress to date of LEI's project to increase the numbers of members of regular and non regular forces taking part in orienteering events in the region.

They knew that orienteering as a sport was already actively encouraged by the military at all levels, as it develops fitness, map reading, navigation, self dependence and competitiveness all of which are essential military skills. They were also aware that local units take part in various Eastern Command and National knockout competitions and leagues, but LEI hoped to offer and encourage increased opportunities for training and competition for all troops. This for the units concerned must result in wider selection for teams and better trained orienteers and soldiers.

This initiative is initially being directed principally at units based in Leicestershire, Rutland and Northampton, but naturally any units outside this area that contact us will also be encouraged and introduced to other clubs in the region. LEI see Cadet units, Territorial Army and reserve units as being the main beneficiaries of this initiative along with any Regular Army or Air Force units that may be interested. They hope to extend similar support into police and fire departments and any other similar bodies.

They are seeking to offer access to good quality local events all year round plus opportunities to go to badge events, night events, special events (long O, cycle O etc.).

LEI can help set up one off, league or knockout competitions for groups of units to compete in. They can also provide separate courses for the military or separate results listings on mixed courses. They can also provide information, training and liaison.

None of this is unique to LEI but as it was being promoted by them with possible spin off effects to other clubs in the region EMOA did provide a grant to assist their efforts.

Mike Luxton initiated this concept when the Groups Development Officer on the LEI committee.

During 2000 a circular was sent to all parts of eastern command. The results from this were a little disappointing but LEI did receive a number of enquiries and had discussions with a number of groups and were contemplating a series of events during early 2001 preceded by some form of basic instruction.

Unfortunately foot and mouth came along and by the time things got back to normal Mike had moved on for personal reasons and has left LEI.

LEI have provided free maps and instructions to a number of units who felt they had enough expertise to proceed with minimum input from the Club and Andy Portsmouth, LEI Vice Chairman, did take a day off work to join in a forces local championship. Quite an experience! Their fitness left him feeling somewhat old but he was less complimentary about their O's skills or the course planning and LEI still feel they can offer considerable assistance at all levels within the forces.

Controllers within the club have done postal arm chair reviews of proposed courses that have been well received.

LEI have a new Groups Development Officer in Roger Kelly who is now actively re-instating the programme. He has been in touch with the Services Recruitment Office and established new contacts with both the Army and RAF Cottesmore on which he hopes to build

He has recently started regular sessions with a group of cadets (he now wants to indent for a bud hailer) and feels this may be the more productive avenue to pursue.

He has agreed a programme of 6 sessions, the first of which was an evening lecture at their headquarters. Second was a practical introduction at Burbage Comm on where 9 Cadets used the permanent course.

The third will be further training on Burbage Comm on POC and the other 3 dates will be attendance at LEI's next 3 events - Grace Dieu, Swithland and Burbage.

LEI have agreed in principle to challenge Units to competitions and will use this whenever it seems the best way of promoting Group Development. It is envisaged that these will be a mix of orienteering and cross country running but experience in the past with running clubs suggests this is not always a good idea because it can be a deterrent

when the orienteers keep winning. Many members are good runners and can compete successfully in that area whilst the opposition are usually weak on the orienteering front.

Amongst the other groups LEI are in contact with from the initial circulation is another group of Cadets in Northamptonshire who want to use Harlestone Firs. LEI's map of these woods is stale and the area has not been used for many years. It is part of the Athorpe Estate and since the death of Princess Diana it was at first closed and now only apparently available at the cost of a substantial contribution to her memorial fund. If this unit can use their connections, however, to get into the estate at reasonable cost, LEI have offered to produce a map free of charge in exchange for the right to stage 'joint' events.

It is apparent that a large part of the work Roger can do is in putting a display on at open days and acting as 'teacher' in training sessions and he is putting together a suitable display to go onto an allweather stand he is purchasing.

This project is proving successful if slow with only long term gain. It is a shame that impetus was lost during the F & M crisis and LEI may consider a full circulation again to trigger more interest. At present training and assisting various units is useful but eventually they want to have numbers of units involved who can be brought together for tailored events.

Long term many may be encouraged to join clubs as individuals and given their levels of fitness etc., could be a source of helpers and event officials which are becoming increasingly hard to find.

A volunteer (or volunteers) is required to take over the management of the SI kit on behalf of the East Midlands Orienteering Association. The role involves:

- Managing the booking forms used for the kit and ensuring that the kit is available for events (though the kit often goes direct from one official to another).
- Changing the batteries supplied with the kit
- Developing systems for securing numbers to stakes
- Liaising with the suppliers of the kit
- Ensuring all stakes have punches
- Replacing slips when broken
- Making sure labels inside the boxes are still there

The National Forest

One of my roles in addition to being your Chairman is to represent orienteering on the National Forest Access and Recreation Working Group.

The National Forest covers 200 square miles across parts of Leicestershire, Derbyshire and Staffordshire and is transforming the landscape, blending ancient woodlands with new planting and other habitats. Already 4 million trees have been planted over a total of more than 470 new woodlands. Grants are available from the National Forest Company to extend woodlands and create new ones within the forest boundary.

Several new orienteering areas are coming on stream. DVO have a number of smaller units but have just been introduced to a new scheme in the planning stage which should eventually be able to host a C4.



LEI have the lions share at present with 4 potential C4 areas coming on. Bagworth was used for the National Forest Trophy last year towards the end of the foot and mouth troubles and is being extended further at present. A large new event area near Ibstock will be used as a C4 for the trophy next year.

In addition new plantings are extending existing areas and improving them for our purposes. The areas around Ratby and Groby already include many pockets of mature woodland and new woodlands which we use under the Global title of Ratby Woodlands. Burroughs Wood was greatly extended in 1995, Peartree Wood was created in 1997 and Grey Lodge Wood was planted in 1999, all with funding from The National Forest. The three woods are adjacent to Martinshaw which is an historic existing woodland. Together, Martinshaw, Peartree, Burroughs and Grey Lodge Woods, now comprise a block of about 425 acres of woodland, one of the largest in Leicestershire. There are two further new woods being created alongside which will increase it further with the next re-mapping.

The history of the ancient woodland in Martinshaw is going full circle. It was mentioned in the Domesday book and was originally part of a large deer park owned by the Grey and De Ferrers families and in the thirteenth century was home to both deer and pigs and was used for coppicing, quarrying and hay production. This was in fact the source of the stone used to build Kirby Muxloe Castle.

For the last few hundred years the woods were actively managed to provide a renewable source of fuel. They used to clear-fell about 50 acres every 20 years or so to produce coppice poles for this purpose, but the two world wars saw the areas badly over felled. It had been sold by the Bradgate Estate to the Forestry Commission and they sold it on to the Woodland Trust in 1986.

Under the Forestry Commission's ownership it changed from being predominantly sessile oak and hazel to largely conifer production but this is now slowly being reversed. Areas of conifer around surviving oak have been cleared and other areas will be, when they

mature to commercial value. Some of the constrained clumps will be retained however both to provide some winter foliage and protection for birds and other creatures.

The rocky tip to the Markfield side of the woods, where the quarrying was carried out in yesteryear is the most diverse for wildlife as the shallow and acidic topsoil has never allowed for intensive management. The historic nature of this woodland is disclosed by plants such as broad-leaved helleborine, sanicle, wood anemone, yellow archangel, primrose, dogs mercury and wood sorrel. The mix of conifer and broadleaf together with the adjoining pasture land support about 40 different bird species, the more unusual of which are, perhaps, the woodcock, greater spotted woodpecker, jay, several owls and goldcrest.

There are 36 different species of tree in Martinshaw and this sustains a population of 270 species of moth, several of which are very rare.

Burroughs Wood has a core of old mixed woodland now surrounded by new plantings of native species which are maturing nicely. Peartree Woods run down both sides of the valley running out of Ratby and are again planted with native species of tree and a picturesque little stream runs along the valley bottom. This area gives an abundance of contours not seen elsewhere in the Martinshaw area. Grey Lodge Wood fills the gap between Martinshaw Wood and the M1. The newest woods being created will both enlarge the area but also make it less linear.

If LEI can get formal permission to use them there are also sizeable extensions being created to Beacon Hill, Gracedieu and Benscliffe and the later would effectively link these woodlands to Bradgate Park.
